An exhibition on display at Nevada Humanities Program Gallery showcasing an array of fashion and costume designers who share their visions for iconic Las Vegas showgirl costumes in drawings that bring the spectacle to life on the stage.

October 6, 2023—LAS VEGAS, NV—Nevada Humanities presents a new exhibition, *Icon of Las Vegas, the Spectacular Showgirl: Showgirl Costume Designs from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, University Libraries, Special Collections & Archives,* on display from October 5 – November 22, 2023, at the Nevada Humanities Program Gallery, which is located at 1017 South 1st Street, #190, in Las Vegas. An inperson reception will take place on Thursday, November 16, 2023, at 5 - 8 pm PT and at 6 pm PT a discussion and reading from the 2023 *Las Vegas Writes* anthology *Feather Shows: Las Vegas Writers on Film, TV, and Other Spectacles*, featuring authors Angela M. Brommel, Jenessa Kenway, and Nancy Wright Hardy. Each author has a story that swirls around the experiences of women in the glittering fabric that is Las Vegas. Space is limited. Icon of Las Vegas, the Spectacular Showgirl features the costume drawings from the creative designers that brought the glamorous showgirl on stage in sparkling rhinestones, vast arrays of feathers, shimmering silks and translucent fabrics that dazzled as dancers moved across the stages of shows such as Jubilee, Hallelujah Hollywood, and Pzazz! In showrooms up and down the Las Vegas Strip over the decades these designers brought exciting reviews to audiences from across the globe and into the history and lore of Las Vegas.

"Although the great fishnet and feather production shows are a thing of the past, our collections of colorful and elegant showgirl costume designs are just one of the many unique ways that UNLV Special Collections and Archives documents the history of Las Vegas entertainment. We hope that the designs on display in the gallery provide a small glimpse into the glamorous world of the Las Vegas showgirl, and the minds of creative designers such as Jerry Jackson, Pete Menefee, and Bill Campbell," says Su Kim Chung, Head of Special Collections Public Services, University Libraries.

"At Nevada Humanities, we are pleased that our latest exhibition, *Icon of Las Vegas, the Spectacular Showgirl*, highlights a different side of Las Vegas history by featuring the designs of the iconic Las Vegas showgirl costumes," says Christina Barr, executive director of Nevada Humanities. This exhibition showcases the talented costume designers along with their intricate designs for the famously flamboyant costumes."
