

## **Nevada Humanities Moves Salon Program Online with a Virtual Salon**

Indigenous Narratives in the Modern Context

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May 7, 2020—RENO, Nev—Nevada Humanities presents the next installment of its bimonthly *Salon* series online at <a href="mailto:facebook.com/nevadahumanities">facebook.com/nevadahumanities</a> on Friday, May 15, 2020, 6:00-7:00 pm. <a href="mailto:Indigenous Narratives">Indigenous Narratives</a> in the <a href="mailto:Modern Context">Modern Context</a> will feature a virtual discussion about journalism, jurisdictional issues, and Indigenous narratives.

Moderated by Stacey Montooth, Executive Director of the State of Nevada Indian Commission, a diverse panel of experts, including Autumn Harry, Tsanavi Spoonhunter, and Jarrette Werk, will discuss how Indigenous histories are often ignored within the United States, which has led to the erasure of place-based narratives. A panel of Native scholars and journalists will discuss how colonial mapping practices have created complex jurisdictional issues, inspiring a new generation of journalists and storytellers.
